Wednesday, July 27 Trip to the FLAT COUNTRY Proposed Timber Sale Area

Flat Country is a public lands timber sale off of Highway 126 which is 2 hours from Corvallis. It is slated for a regeneration harvest (aka clear cut) despite objections from Oregon Wild and Cascadia Wildlands. Flat Country fits into the "Top 10 Bad Logging Projects" as identified by the Climate Forests Campaign with trees ranging from 40 to 140 years old. This hiking trip is an opportunity for the Broads to hike some of these pristine parcels before they are cut down. The area has been field checked by Cascadia Wildlands, so this is not a classic field checking trip. There is a "sort of trail" on one of the units, but the terrain it is fairly flat and open for hiking. There are some beautiful water features and classic mature forests to enjoy.



The Corvallis folks can meet behind the Super 8 at 8:30 a.m. The Eugene and mid-valley folks can meet at Ollalie Campground on Highway 126 at 10:30 a.m.
